### **Executive Insight: January 2025**

From the Desk of Dr Hermione Parsons, ALC CEO & Managing Director

Happy new year to you all, and welcome to Q2 of the 21st century.

I'm delighted to announce details for the ALC's Supply Chain Summit 2025 - 21 August 2025, Sydney. The rapidly changing global environment, plus an Australian election result, will provide fertile ground for serious debate at the Summit. Fortunately, we have a few months to observe this extraordinary geopolitical era and digest change around the world.

At the World Economic Forum in Davos, Economist Impact and DP World shared research highlighting that 75% of businesses are restructuring their supply chains due to uncertainties stemming from Washington's "America First" agenda. Around 40% of companies reported increasing their reliance on US-based suppliers. The "Trade in Transition" study, which surveyed 3,500 supply chain executives globally, found that businesses are rapidly adapting to growing protectionism and shifting geopolitical dynamics. Moreover, 71% of respondents believe that diversifying supply chains to countries like Vietnam, Mexico, India, the UAE, and Brazil could mitigate risks associated with global trade.

The Summit will be an important opportunity to think, to discuss and to explore what it all means for our country and our industry. And in the lead up, the refresh of the ALC Strategy - to build Supply Chain Resilience, Sustainability, Productivity and Awareness is showing our priorities remain on point.

But what impact will the USA withdrawal from the Paris Climate Agreement have on supply chain sustainability and resilience in Australia, where time and time again our freight logistics chains are blocked by increasingly severe and frequent climate events? To what extent will government support of productivityenhancing technology fare in an era where some of the world's richest technology creators are now helping to run the USA? And how will Australia respond to rapidly changing views and laws about people and workforces including diversity, inclusion, and equity?

The Australian Logistics Council will continue to monitor these developments closely and make sure we remain at the forefront advocating for modern supply chains for Australia during these extraordinary times.

We look forward to working with you.

Transport & Logistics: Third Highest Hiring Industry in Australia for Q4, 2024

The Work Watch Employment Report by Work Skills reveals that transport and logistics was the third highest hiring industry in Australia for Quarter 4 in 2024, with truck driver hires rising by 30.1%.

This surge in demand for truck drivers aligns with the 2024 Occupation Shortage List (OSL) findings ALC reported on in November 2024, which ranks truck drivers as the fourth most critically undersupplied role nationwide. This stark statistic underscores the deepening talent crisis facing this essential sector. The OSL's upcoming replacement of the current Skilled Migration Occupation List – a transition the ALC strongly supported and actively advocated for during the recent ABS ANZSCO review – marks a crucial step toward addressing this challenge.

We remain resolute in our advocacy for robust policies that tackle these workforce challenges head-on and build a sustainable talent pipeline, as the severe shortage of skilled truck drivers continues to pose a significant threat to the efficiency and resilience of Australia's logistics sector.

## **Policy Updates & Recent Submissions**



## 2025-26 Federal Budget

#### Strategic Investments for a Resilient Supply Chain

The ALC has made a submission for the 2025-26 Federal Budget, prioritising strategic investments to enhance Australia's supply chain resilience, sustainability, and productivity. Central to this submission is the establishment of a National Freight Corridors Fund to alleviate bottlenecks on key freight routes, strengthen intermodal connectivity, and upgrade critical infrastructure such as bridges, tunnels, and rail assets to support the efficient movement of freight, including zero-emission heavy vehicles.

The submission also advocates for modal shift strategies and rail infrastructure resilience, highlighting the need for increased investment in rail capacity, improved last-mile rail connections, and streamlined planning processes to unlock rail freight efficiencies. Enhanced rail network reliability will complement broader efforts to ensure balanced growth across all freight modes.

On fuel security, ALC proposes boosting refining capacity, expanding strategic stockpiles, and reinforcing freight prioritisation frameworks to maintain essential supply flows during disruptions.

In addressing workforce development, ALC recommends expanding the Wayfinder: Supply Chain for Women initiative to attract diverse talent and funding for freight-specific micro-credentials to upskill workers in emerging technologies and sustainable logistics practices.

The submission also calls for targeted measures to accelerate the transition to zero-emission vehicles, including infrastructure upgrades, financial incentives, and equitable road user pricing reforms. It emphasises the importance of pricing mechanisms that are mode-neutral, transparent, and designed to avoid distorting market competition or penalising one transport mode disproportionately.

## **Expert Network**

The ALC and the National Transport Research Organisation (NTRO) hosted the Transport Resilience Network Forum in Port Melbourne. The event brought together key stakeholders from the freight and logistics sector, researchers, and government leaders to discuss innovative strategies for building resilient transport systems in the face of disruptions and natural events. Highlights included a tour of NTRO's advanced material testing facilities, a showcase of cutting-edge infrastructure vehicles, and presentations on data-driven approaches to network vulnerability assessments and climate-resilient planning.

Key moments of the forum was the presentation by William Tieppo, Victoria's Deputy Secretary at the Department of Transport & Planning, who outlined Victoria's major network maintenance priorities. He emphasized the importance of targeted investments in infrastructure resilience to support the state's transport and logistics capabilities.

Doug Fryer APM GAICD from Linfox also gave an engaging presentation on the threats to safety that drivers face on a day-to-day basis.

The forum concluded with collaborative discussions on actionable strategies for enhancing infrastructure sustainability and resilience, reinforcing the collective goal of fostering a safer, more reliable transport network for Australia
