We kicked off the month in Melbourne with another successful Wayfinder: Supply Chain Careers for Women Freight Heartland Awareness Tour, giving students and career changers a first-hand look at

the diversity and impact of careers across our sector. Thanks to our industry partners who continue to open their doors and help us showcase the real people and opportunities behind modern supply chain and logistics.

ALC was also proud to contribute to two important national policy conversations this month. Dr Kerry Schott joined a special ALC Council 24-Hour Economy Roundtable discussion highlighting the role of supply chain logistics and freight transport in a modern, highly productive and sustainable economy. We also participated in Minister Catherine King's Productivity Roundtable, emphasising the critical link between efficient supply chains and national productivity, and outlining the reforms required across planning, infrastructure, workforce and regulation.

This week marked the first parliamentary sitting week for the spring session, and the ALC team was in Canberra for a busy schedule. We met with Jim Betts, Secretary DITRDCSA and his team, Minister Catherine King, Minister Andrew Giles' team, and the team from Treasury, reiterating that Australia cannot deliver on productivity, sustainability or cost-of-living relief without high-performing supply chains.

We joined the Victorian Government's Consultation on its Climate Change Strategy, hosted by Parliamentary Secretary Sheena Watt, contributing ideas on how the freight and logistics sector can support Victoria's decarbonisation goals. We welcomed the release of Transport for NSW's Freight Policy Reform Report, which opens important conversations around planning reform, infrastructure, performance-based regulation, and data use.

We're currently in Darwin actively contributing to the National Fuel Council where the focus is on fuel security, supply chain resilience and national preparedness. Fuel continues to be essential to every aspect of supply chain in Australia and globally.

The current rapid pace of strategic development across Australia's governments indicates the perfect positioning of the ALC strategy - addressing productivity, sustainability and resilience - as the critical challenges facing Australia's supply chain future.

Thank you, as always, to our members for your continued engagement, insight and support. We're proud to be advocating on your behalf and look forward to seeing you at the 2025 ALC Supply Chain Summit in Sydney on 21st August.

ALC Advocacy & Engagment Highlights

Strong ALC Voice at Minister King's Transport Productivity Roundtable




CEO, Hermione Parsons, participated in the Ministerial Transport Productivity Round Table, representing members and reinforcing the sector's critical role in Australia's economic performance. As part of ongoing engagement with Government, ALC continues to advocate for freight productivity to be addressed as a core pillar of the National Freight and Supply Chain Strategy. Feedback from Government confirms that ALC's input is contributing meaningfully to national policy development, ensuring that freight productivity and supply chain resilience remain central to future reform efforts.

Night-Time Freight in a 24/7 Economy



Dr Kerry Schott AO met with ALC members to discuss building a true 24-hour freight economy aligned with commercial, infrastructure, workforce, and community needs. Members shared firsthand insights to support Dr Schott's engagement with the NSW Transport Minister, highlighting that infrastructure alone is not enough. Real progress requires coordinated policy reform - addressing fragmented land-use planning, regulatory misalignment, and social licence, to enable efficient, round-the-clock freight movement across the supply chain. We are delighted that Dr Schott has been invited to attend Treasurer Jim Chalmers Productivity Summit.

Another Successful Wayfinder Tour in Melbourne!



On 1 July, Wayfinder: Supply Chain Careers for Women hosted its Freight Heartland Tour in West Melbourne, offering 35 participants a unique look inside Australia's vital logistics sector. The day began at the high-tech Toll Mars Wrigley Distribution Centre in Truganina, where attendees were inspired by the facility's automation and career opportunities. The tour continued at Foodbank Victoria, providing a real-world perspective on how logistics supports everyday life. The experience wrapped up with a cruise around the Port of Melbourne, featuring stories from women working in the industry who shared what drives their passion for supply chain careers. Thank you to our host partners Toll Group, Foodbank Victoria and the Port of Melbourne for helping us inspire the next generation of supply chain leaders.

Renee, a participant from Hobsons Bay, reflected: "The day gave more insight into the logistics sector... I found it valuable in terms of the connections I made."

ALC Policy Updates

ALC Submission to NSW Net Zero Commission

ALC made a submission to the NSW Net Zero Commission outlining 14 targeted recommendations to support freight decarbonisation while maintaining supply chain continuity. Key priorities included mode-specific emissions tracking, integration of freight demand into electricity planning, and fast-tracked approvals for electric charging and hydrogen refuelling in freight precincts. The submission also recommended ZEV sales targets with supporting incentives, co-investment in zero- and low-emissions locomotives, and digitisation of intermodal terminals to improve emissions visibility. ALC advocated for freight-specific climate resilience planning, expanded use of real-time climate data, and coordinated adaptation strategies.

Additional priorities included support for renewable diesel, harmonised planning rules for low-emissions logistics hubs, and a nationally consistent road-user charging framework. We continue to emphasise that decarbonisation policy must reflect the operational realities of freight, particularly for long-haul and regional supply chains, to ensure reforms are both effective and commercially viable.

Economic Reform Roundtable Consultation Submission

ALC's submission to Treasury outlined priority reforms to position logistics and end-to-end supply chains as a key national productivity and resilience driver. As part of the Productivity Roundtable process, ALC urged the immediate release and implementation of the National Freight and Supply Chain Strategy, regulatory reforms to support a flexible 24-hour freight economy, modernisation of heavy vehicle licensing, and structural reforms to enable a modal shift to more sustainable freight modes such as rail and coastal shipping. This shift is essential to supporting Australia's national transition to net zero emissions targets.

The submission also identified taxation settings, energy resilience, and freight data digitisation as critical enablers of productivity. With freight contributing 8.6% of GDP and facing rising demand and systemic risk exposure, ALC advocated for coordinated reform that treats supply chain logistics as sovereign economic infrastructure; essential to controlling inflation, strengthening economic security, and achieving long-term prosperity.

Port of Brisbane Launches Vision 2060



The Port of Brisbane has launched Vision 2060, a bold and future-focused roadmap designed to strengthen Queensland's economic position, future-proof trade, and drive the transition to a more sustainable and efficient port. Developed in collaboration with industry, government, and community stakeholders and grounded in research, Vision 2060 outlines how the port will embrace innovation, economic growth, and environmental stewardship.

By 2060, Queensland's population is expected to reach 8.3 million, with container trade set to triple and cruise passenger volumes projected to more than quadruple. Energy demand could increase ten-fold as the port community decarbonises. This anticipated growth presents an opportunity to reimagine how infrastructure is planned and operated - ensuring it is resilient, agile, and adaptable to evolving needs. The vision sets out three key areas of focus: improving logistics connectivity, leading in clean energy innovation, and designing a port that supports resilient infrastructure, a skilled workforce, and sustainable economic development for future generations.


